Dear MWCT supporter,

We have the pleasure to share with you the truly remarkable achievements for 2018. Let us get rid of the bad news first: we did lose 4 lions this year. Three were poisoned by the usual culprit who was released by the judicial system, and one was speared. The speared lion was because of severe predation and this incident was practically unavoidable. The poisoning is unacceptable, but until we engage prosecutors and judges properly, we will still face this deadly challenge. We are working on it...

What is encouraging is the positive, profound and meaningful engagement of the whole community, who understand how their natural resources, from wildlife to forests, are producing services and income. This attitude is the real reason of the successes I am celebrating with you:

- zero poaching of elephants (in Africa, 100 are killed daily)
- increased lion population
- zero fires in the Chyulu Hills, thanks to the REDD+ rangers & community involvement
- better grazing management
- overall increased wildlife population
- restoration of grassland, in partnership with JustDiggIt

We also celebrate the sales of our carbon credits to Tiffany&Co (at \$12/credit), as well as a very good performance from both the education and health programmes; last but not least, we celebrate Muterian Ntanin (MWCT Head Rangers Commander) being appointed the East African GRAA (Game Rangers Association of Africa) Representative serving on their Africa Committee.

A milestone achievement which is really extraordinary is having secured, by partnering with Rosey Aventures and Le Rosey Foundation, the Olpusare spring. In late December we signed a 30-year contract to secure 450 acres of critical wetland. Olpusare is where Greta Garbo, Hemingway, Ruark, Holden and others were camping in the 1950s. The spring was home to rhinos, hippos, elephants and wild dogs, to mention just a few iconic species. It will be protected for the next generation, through a student camp. We will ecologically and botanically restore it. We will reintroduce the crocodile. Hippos will naturally come back. It took Edward, Samson and Luca more than 10 years, but we did it! The community is equally ecstatic. They know this choice gives them a better future. A special thanks goes to the visionary educator Philippe Gudin, who decided to create the conservancy (with just a little bit of convincing by Luca...).

The whole MWCT team is grateful to our donors, particularly to the Leonardo Dicaprio Foundation, for their amazing support. It is thanks to their donations that we are able to continue our success in protecting the wildlife, wilderness and cultural heritage of the Tsavo-Amboseli Maasai community.

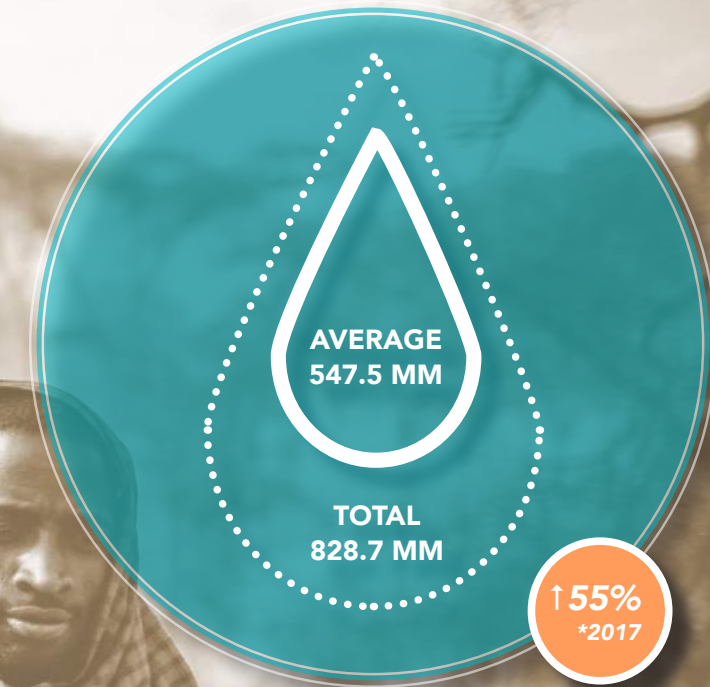

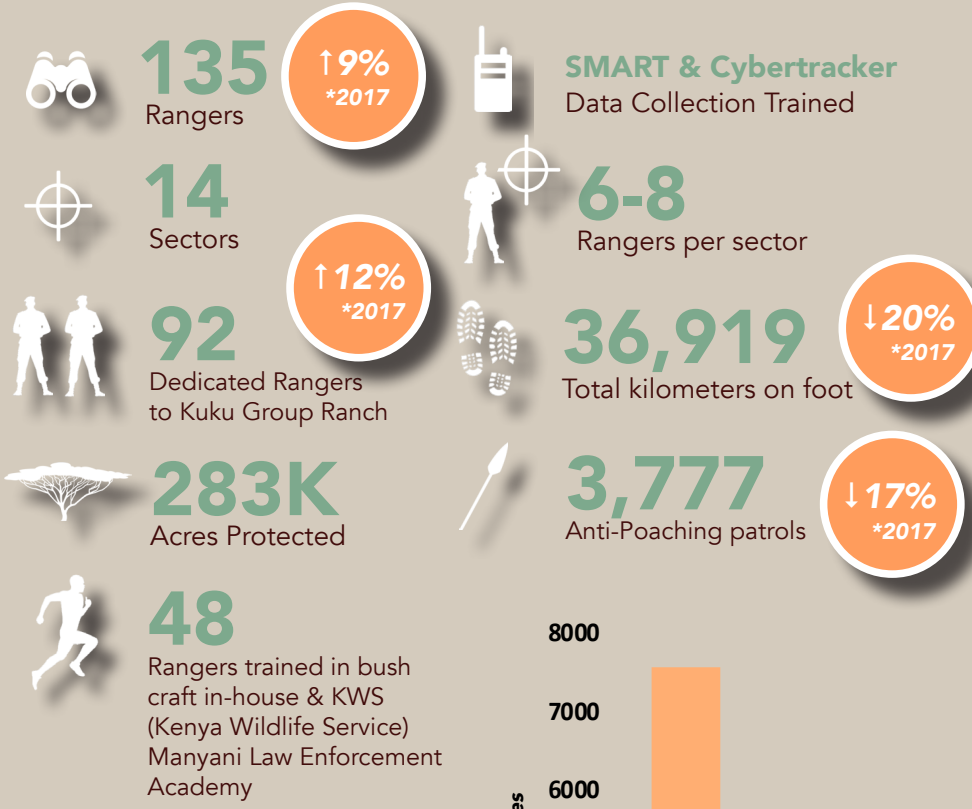

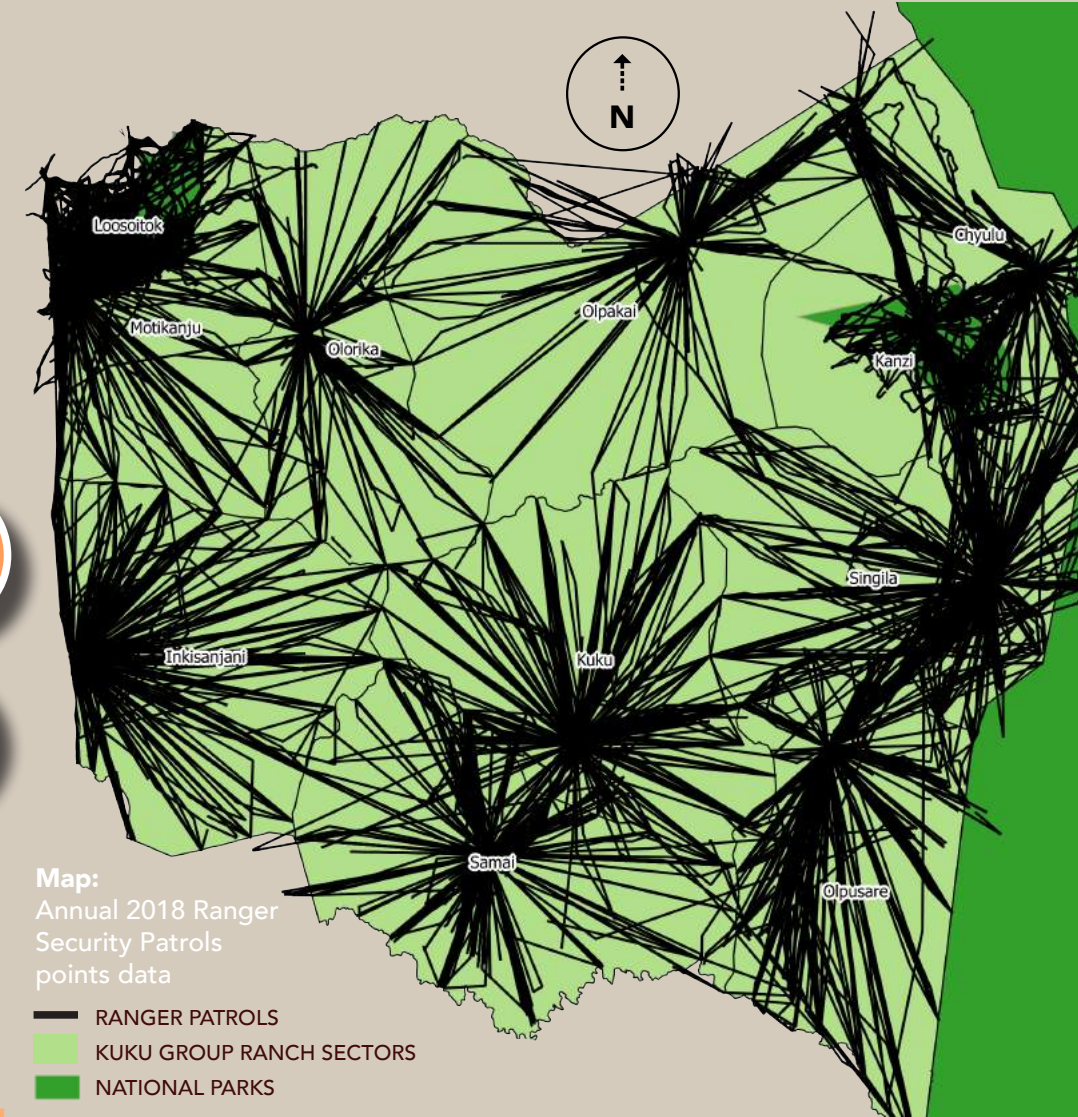
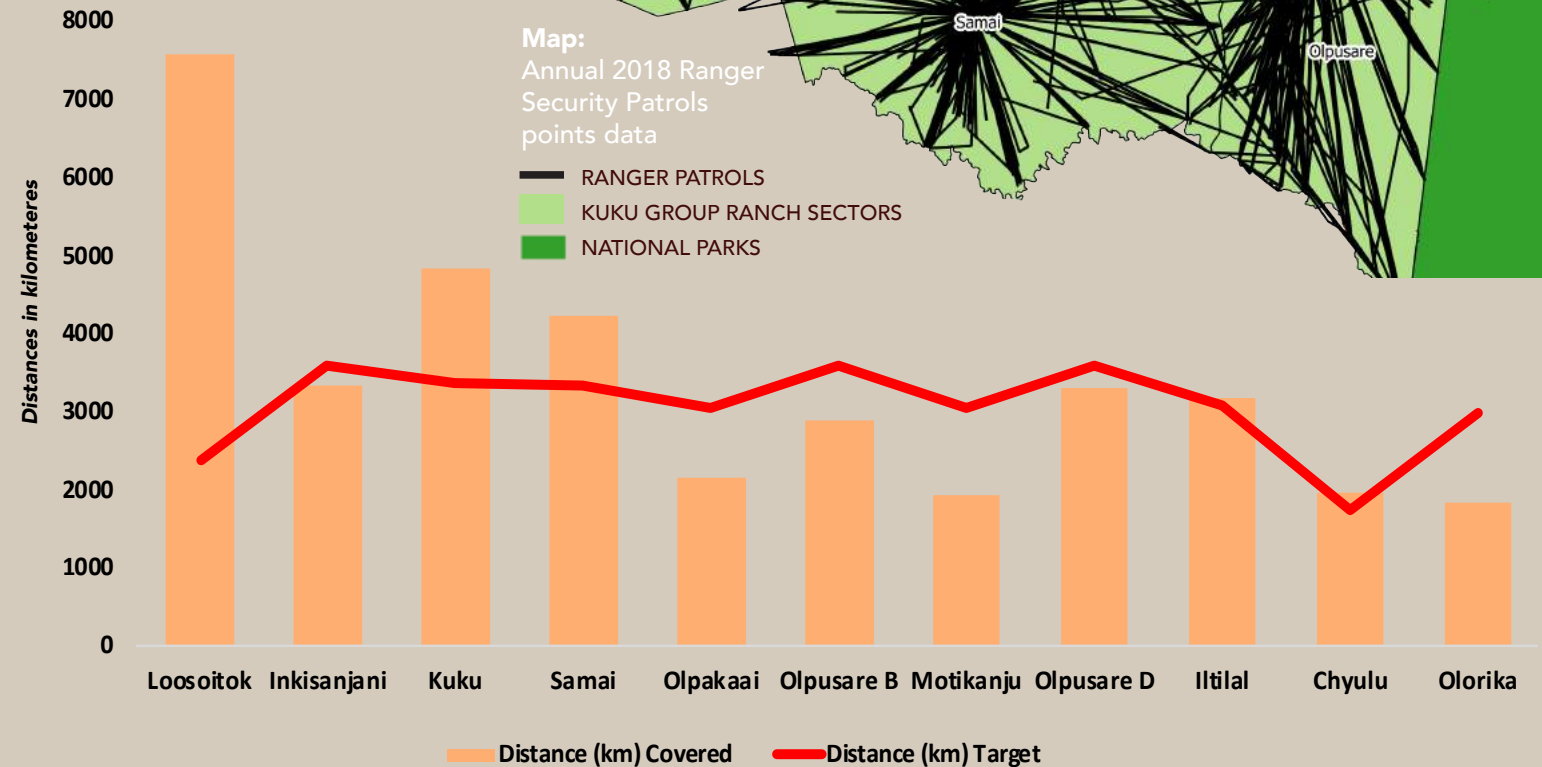

LION MONITORING

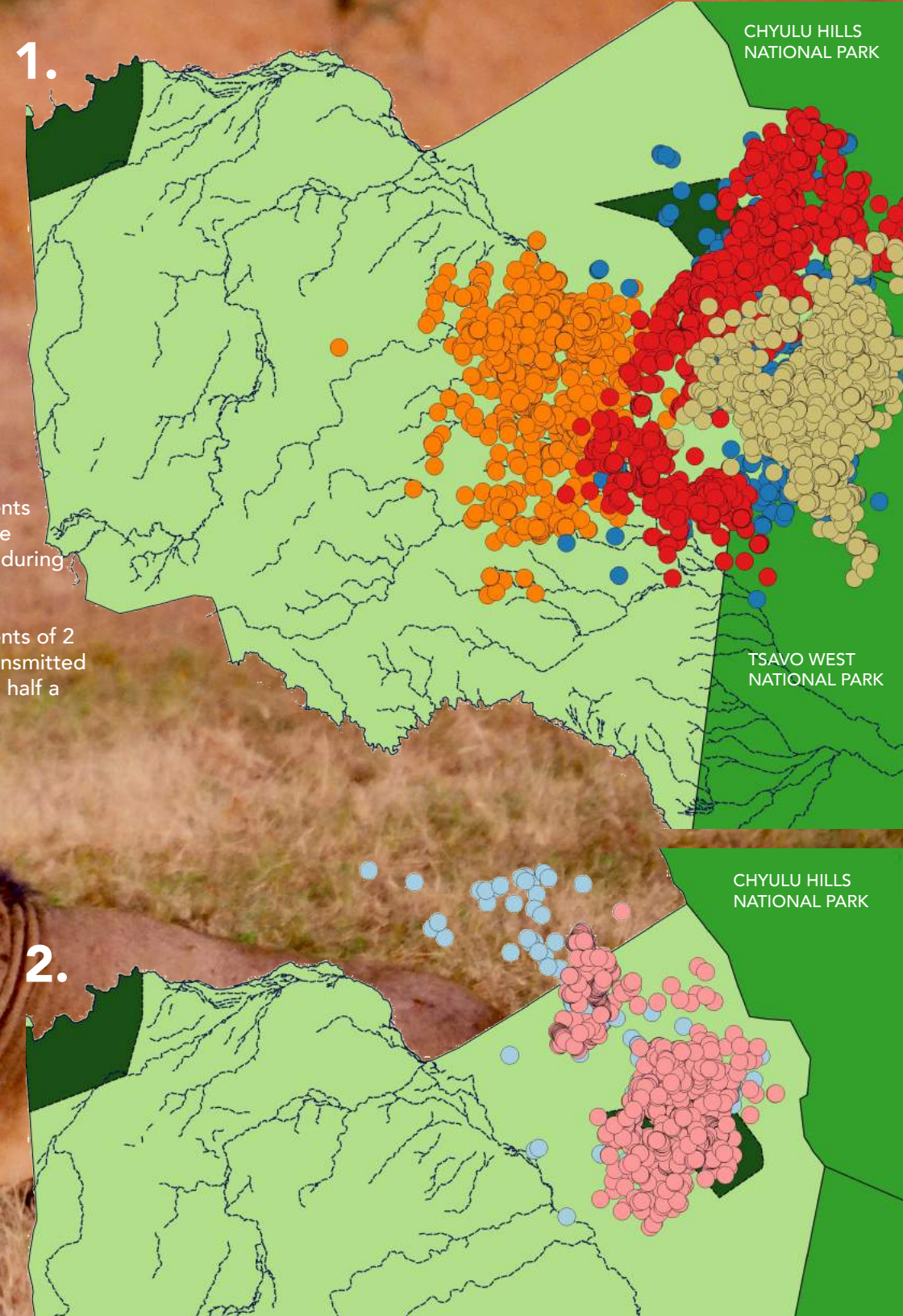
Collaring lions is a critically important step towards mitigating human-wildlife conflict. 6 individual Lions on the Kuku Group Ranch have been collared with GPS/VHF tracking collars and their movement during 2018 is illustrated in the descriptive maps. The monitoring enables our team to collect data on population growth rates and habitat utilisation on Kuku Group Ranch.

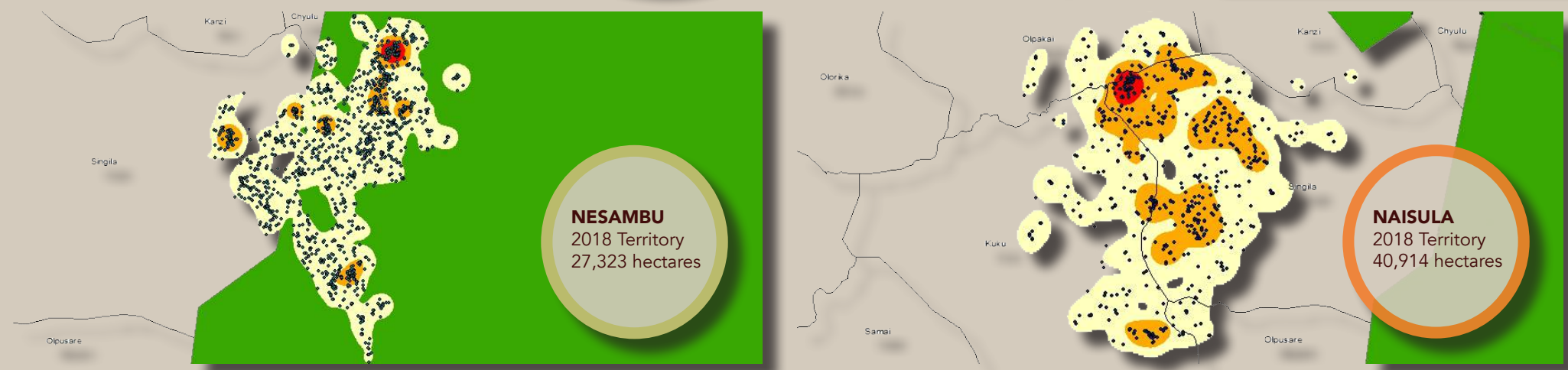


SPOTLIGHT: 3 NEWLY COLLARED

- MAY 12 - MARTI (Male)**
Part of a coalition of 2 brothers and is frequently seen with NESAMBU. He was collared by the team in 2018 at the lava close to Lonkitok after appearing during a calling station.
- MAY 13 - MAWOI (Female)**
Part of a pride of 11 lions. She was collared by the team during the same de-collaring operation of her sister, NELUAI.
- JUNE 16 - NAISULA (Female)**
Part of a pride of 2 females. Her collaring mission was linked with MWCT's collaborative partnership with Naisula School and International Skagerak School. The students were able to immerse themselves in conservation work for a week with the team including this collaring mission, thus the lion was named Naisula.

WILDLIFE MONITORING

SIMBA SCOUTS

This is a **dedicated team of 15 Maasai warriors** (Moran), who day in and day out monitor GPS collared lions and other wildlife species. 14 Moran gather data & the 15th, Peter Sompol (Chief of Kuku Moran) educates the community on lions within the area and is key in helping persuade against lion hunts. Data collected is analysed and used to gauge various aspects of different wildlife species such as their eating habits. The monitoring is also a very significant measure to mitigating human-wildlife conflict within the local Maasai communities.

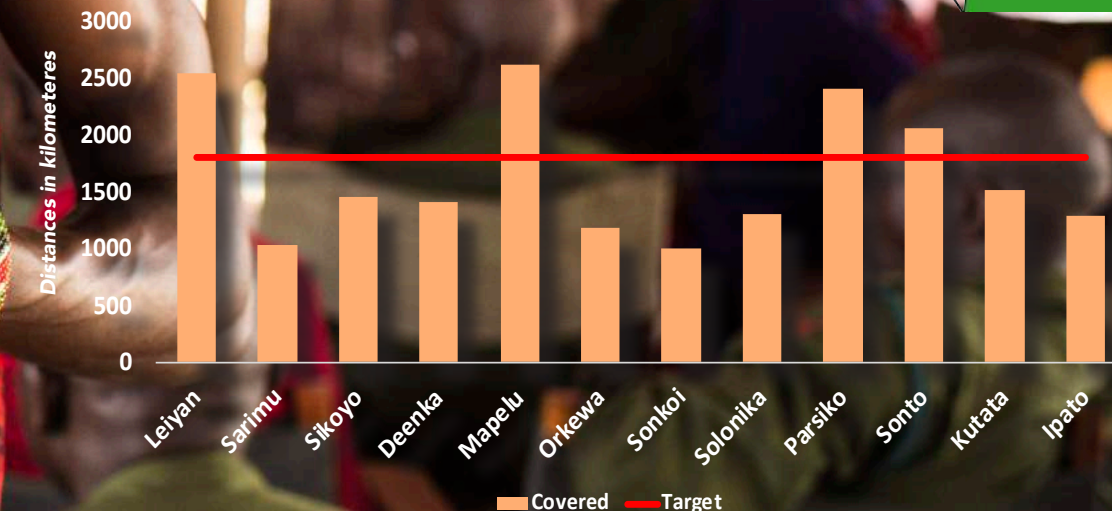
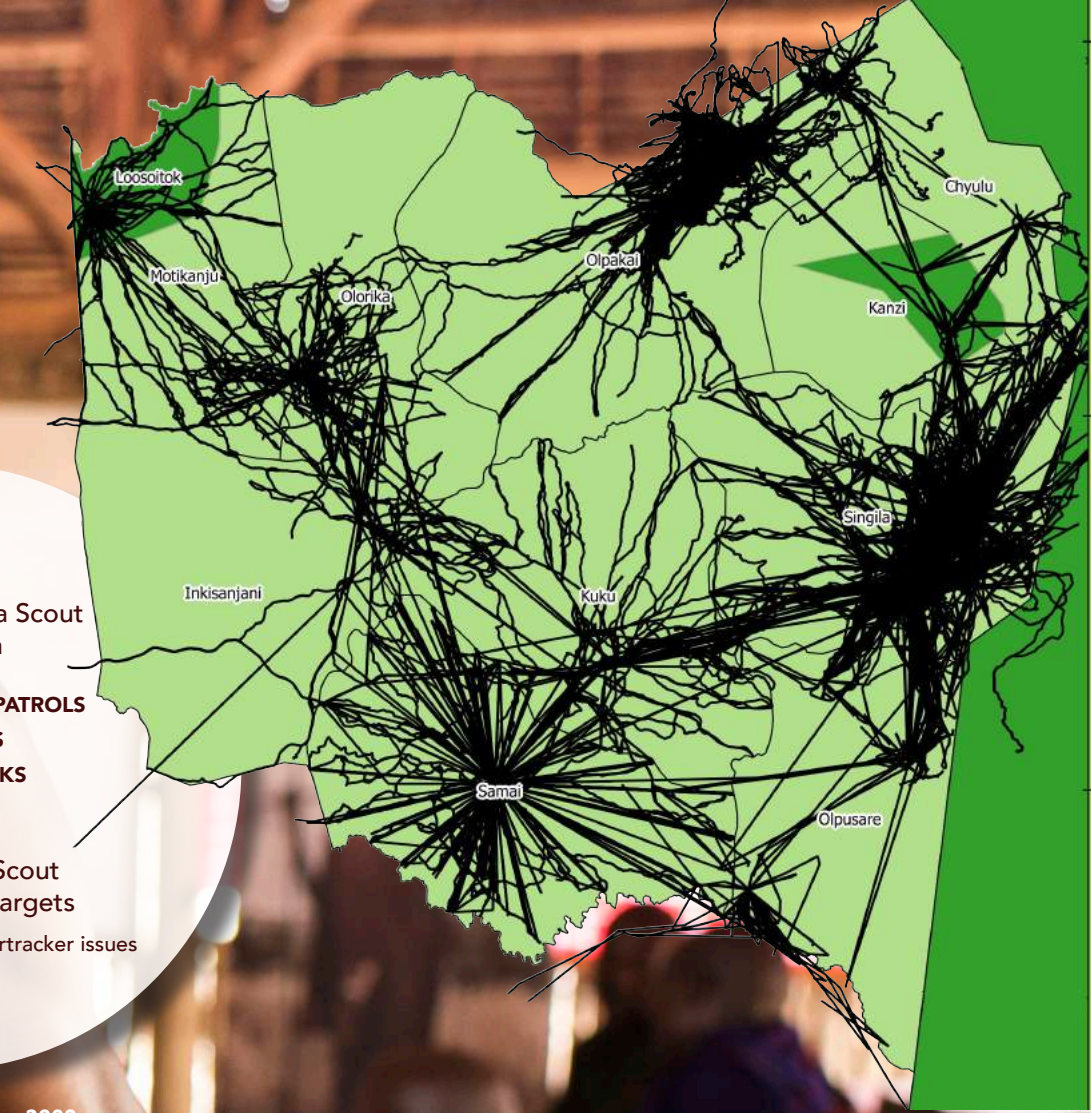

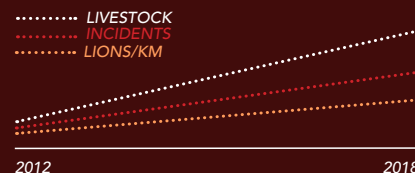
- Multi-layer system of Verification and 4 dedicated Officers

COMMUNITY OUTREACHES

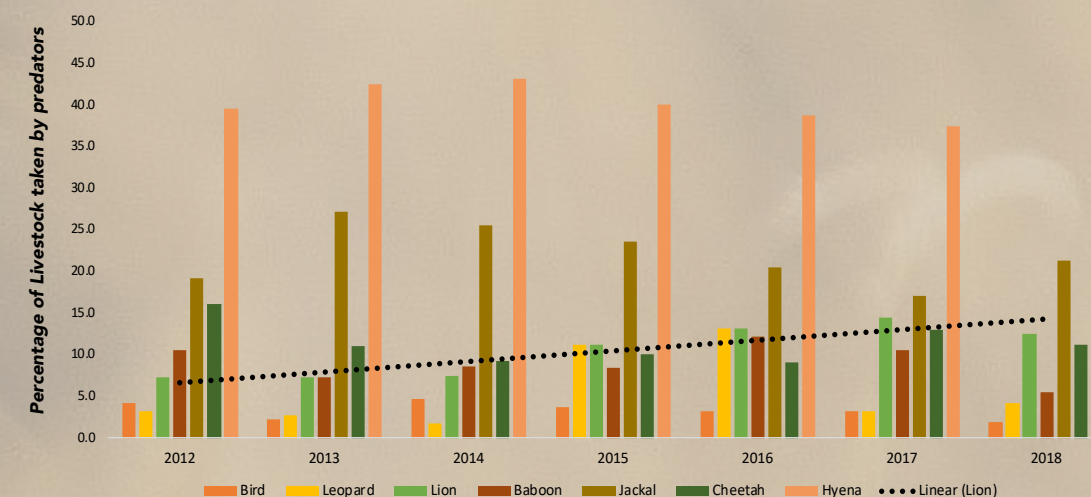
Rangers, prominent community figures and MWCT staff, conduct meetings with communities that are feeling increased pressure of predation, as well as with the young Maasai warriors (Morans), to prevent the groups from any lion killing in retaliation to livestock losses.

During 2018, we observed a minimal decrease in the number of Wildlife Pays incidents recorded and approved for compensation since 2017. Similar to last year, there were significant increases in livestock depredations most evident in the last two quarters of the year and can be attributed to drought conditions and an **influx of livestock** from areas outside of Kuku GR. This, coupled with the **increasing lion population** in Kuku, can lead to raised levels of depredation caused by lions. Even more positive to note is the number of "no negligence" claims, (implying good husbandry), exceed the number of negligent claims. A truly positive sign.

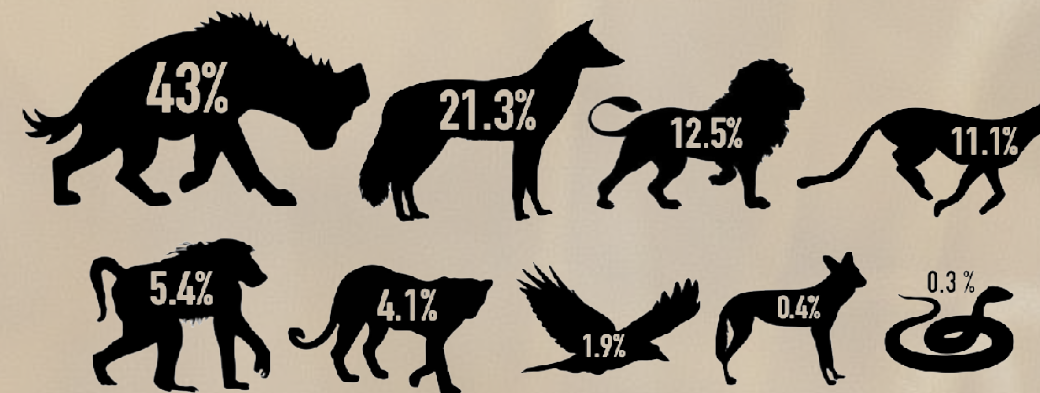
Overall perceived trends are depicted in the graph on the right over a 7 year period.



PREDATORS

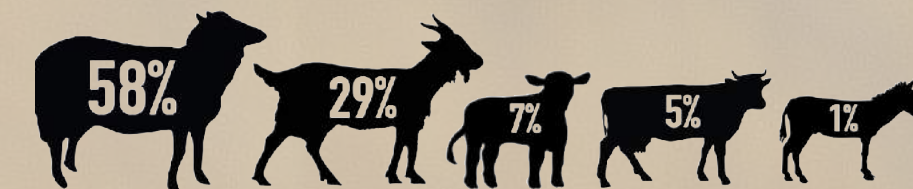


The most livestock taken in relation to predators were due to Hyena. Over the course of 7 years there has also been an overall increase in incidents by lions, this could be due to the recovering lion population in the area. Although there was a decline in lion sightings for 2018 compared to 2017, the overall number for lion sightings over a 5 year period (2013-2017) increased by 19%. Specific percentages for the amount of incidents accounted for in 2018 from each predator are reflected in the info graphic below.



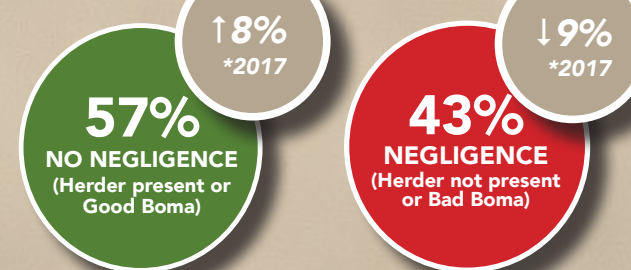
HEADS OF LIVESTOCK

A total of 2,017 heads of livestock were killed this year. The majority of livestock killed by predators were sheep followed by the other livestock species seen in the info graphic below.

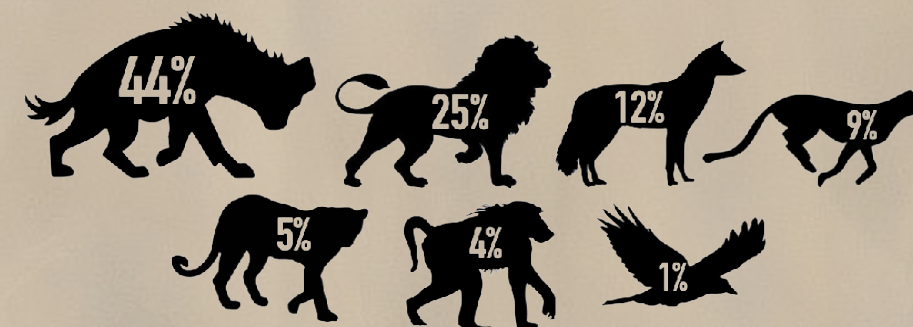


CLAIMS

The total pay-out of claims was **7,718,000 Ksh** (77,175 USD), a decrease to the amount paid in 2017 (7,798,050 Ksh / 78,912 USD). However, the number of no-negligence claims still outweigh that of negligence claims.

KUKU AERIAL CENSUS

WILDLIFE / LIVESTOCK COUNT

AIM: To understand wildlife and livestock distribution/abundance on Kuku Group Ranch MWCT began aerial surveys in 2010 as part of a long-term ecological monitoring plan for the group ranch, and to inform decision making going forward. We monitor trends and changes over time, which is an important part of being able to develop appropriate conservation management strategies to effectively implement adaptive management.

2018 - JUN 4 (Wet Season) & NOV 26 (Dry Season)

Transects were flown systematically between 2 planes, following a north to south bearing at a height of approximately 500 ft and at a speed of approximately 110 mph with an approximate cumulative 7 hours of flight time. Overall the wildlife population remains stable with both reductions and increases in various species population sizes.

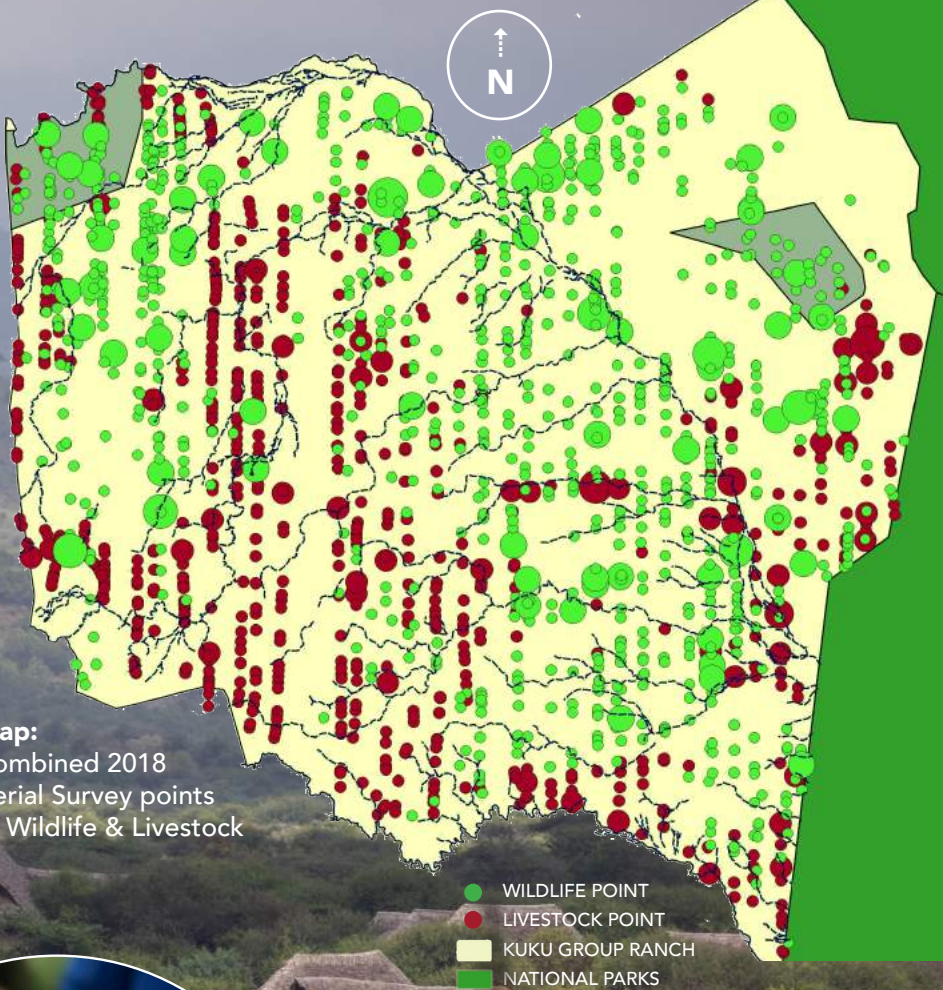

REDD+ CARBON PROJECT

WHAT IS REDD+

The main drivers of forest destruction are economics and poverty. **REDD+** is a mechanism that has been developed through the UN Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) to provide economic incentives to protect forest rather than destroy it.

By protecting forests, greenhouse gas emissions are avoided. The international carbon markets recognise that carbon emissions result in real costs and risks to the planet as a result of the damage caused by climate change – droughts, extreme weather, sea level rise, loss of glaciers, ocean acidification, etc.

Payments to REDD+ projects enable individuals, companies and institutions to reduce their net emissions and receive “**carbon credits**” that offset their carbon footprint.

CHYULU HILLS - a critical corridor

The Chyulu Hills sit close to Kenya’s southern border with Tanzania nestled in front of Mount Kilimanjaro, which towers over this iconic African landscape. The hills themselves, like the great mountain, are the result of the violent volcanic history of this region. They gently rise nearly 4000 ft above the surrounding dry plains and savannah, just high enough to capture the clouds and provide conditions for the growth of a lush tropical montane cloud forest along its ridge tops. The landscape (nearly 4000 sq. km) forms a **critical “bridge”**, linking together two of Kenya’s most important wildlife areas, the greater Tsavo Ecosystem and Amboseli Ecosystem.

This area is home to Kenya’s largest surviving population of elephants and one of its foremost large-scale wildlife and wilderness areas. The **Chyulu Hills REDD+ Project** aims to protect the Chyulu Hills landscape, its forests, woodlands, savannahs, wetlands and springs, and its wild populations of Africa’s best known animals - lions, cheetahs, wild dogs, rhinos, elephants, and various antelopes.

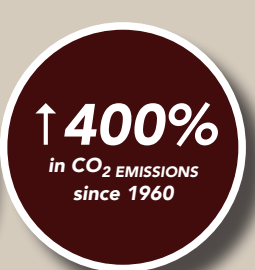
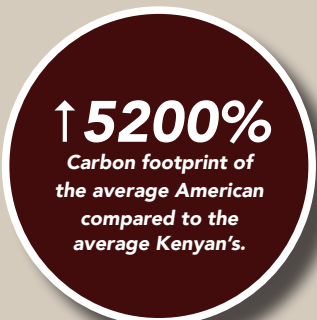

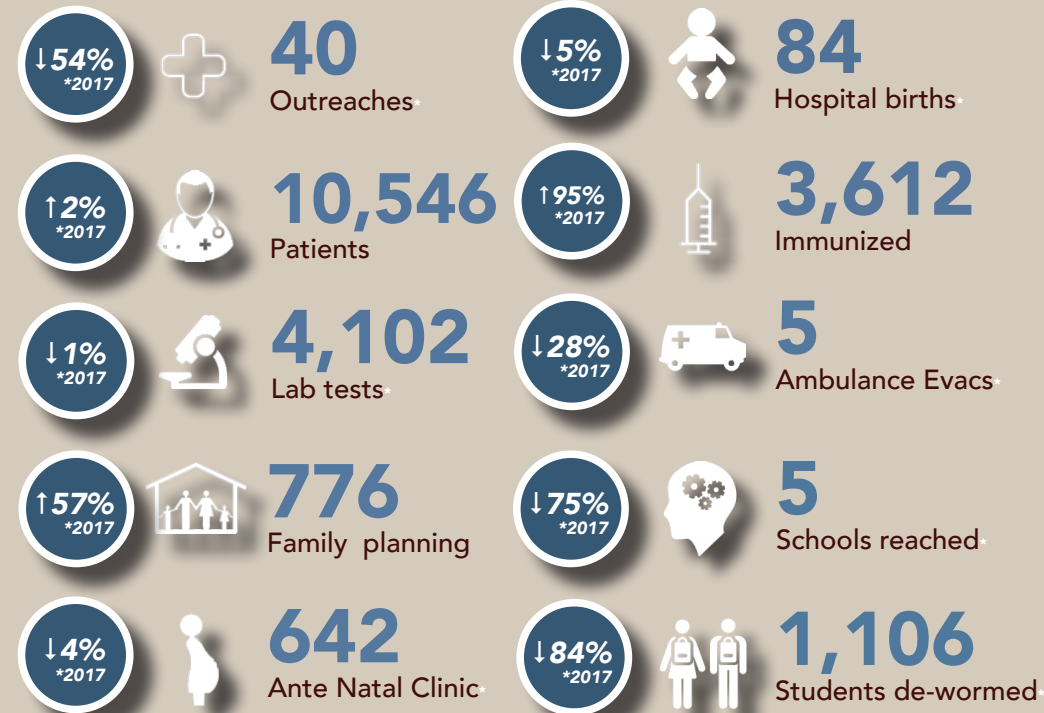

To ensure that the community benefits from our Health Programme, MWCT employs health staff, runs and supports several dispensaries and supplies medical equipment and essential drugs to the community.

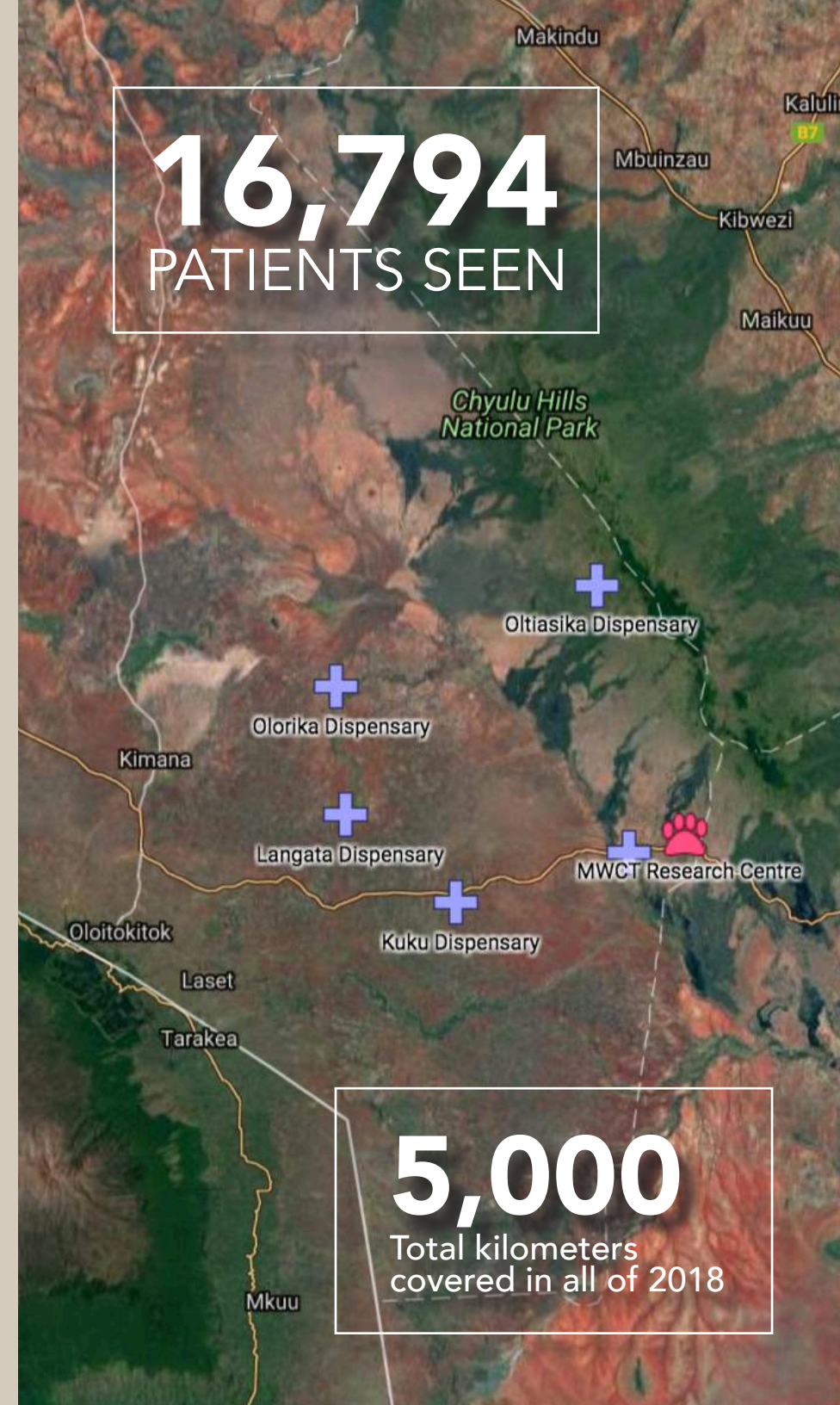
